

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
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
ARTS AND SCIENCES FAIRE

There is to be, upon the days of the 25th and 26th of March, A.S. XII. a celebration of the Arts and Sciences in the Kingdom of Atenveldt. Included in the activities are: workshops, weapons competitions, synthetic sword competition, and articulated gauntlet competitions. There will also be crafts competitions, in the areas of vinting, alchemy, textiles, armor, weapons and assorted wood, leather, and metal objects. And finally competitions in poetry and song (original compositions) and calligraphy.

GOOD PEOPLE OF AM MOR SALANN FASACH------Big News! As most of you have probably heard by now, the Shire will definately be holding a tournament to celebrate out First Birthday in March. Our Shire was founded last March with five people sitting around wondering what to do. ("You be seneschale----at least you've been in SCA before.") We now have more than fifty people who have been coming to events regularly enough to be on the mailing list. So it seemed that holding our first tournament to commemorate the event was only appropriate.

To add to the excitement of our first tournament, the Prince of our own Principality, The Outlands has agreed to grace the event with His Presence. His Highness Heinrich der Jäger and his Princess, Her Highness Lorene of Lircadia will be travelling up from Shadowskeep for the event. Also, His Majesty Koris Natterhelm, King of all Atenveldt, has expressed an interest in attending the tournament. However, being King or Prince is a very financially draining thing with all of the expenses of travelling throughout the area you rule. Therefore, we, as Their faithful subjects, should assist them with their travel expenses, if humanly possible. So dig deep in your pouches and haul out Ye Olde Sock under your mattress and GIVE. Charles of Galway, Shire Reeve, will be holding the sums collected until they can be forwarded to IM and HH. This is an opportunity for the Shire to do things beautifully and in a big way quite early in our growth within the Society, so let's surely take advantage of the chance. (Do you KNOW how long some other areas have had to wait for the privilege of having Royalty at one of their events?) So please support the Shire in this. (Some of you have already and we thank those generous individuals.)

Another thing that we to be working on is the authenticity of our costumes. We need not be rabid on the subject, but you should be able to tell what period your costume is and how it expresses your persons. We have been living in the Current Middle Ages long enough now to be able to give some thought to something beyond just disguising our mundame clothes.

Something that has become a growing problem at events in the past few months as we have grown larger with new people coming in that have not had a chance to really learn about some of the courtesies that are necessary in the Society, is a lack of graclous behavior. A small part of the basic problem is shown by so many of the people when the cornette (herald) is attempting to do her job. Some of us have not understood or heard that when the hardworking herald stands to give an announcement she is to have courteous silence. Unfortunately it has gotten to the point when Rhonwen has to yell "Milords! Miladies!" two and three times to get the attention of the populace and even then many people talk straight through the announcement, not realizing that it is addressed to YOU. The Herald is the voice of the Crown and is entitled to the respect that should be given to the Crown. When she speaks it is time for EVERYONE to be quiet and listen. (This includes the seneschale.) This is all part of the basic courtesy that should be so much a part of the atmosphere at any good SCA event. One of the best explanations for the need for courtesy that I have ever heard/read is found in THE PALE (newsletter for the Middle Kingdom), January of this year and written by an individual who signed it "de Folo, Dragon":

Courtesy is one of the foundations of the Society. Call it respect, politeness, what you will. The fact remains that courtesy allows all the myriad egos and personae to co-exist and allow the Society to function. Without courtedy, the Society would collapse into scattered factions of politicking harpies; the very essense of the Society would be lost. Courtesy lends the Society dignity; without it, we would be just so many overgrown kids running around in costume and hitting each other over the heads with sticks.

We are striving to recreate the spirit of the Middle Ages and courtesy is a big part of it.

Another subject that is dear to my heart is What To Do With Tuesday Evening. Most of you are aware that Tuesday night is fighters' practice at Granite Park Junior High starting at 7:00 P.M. or so. Now many of us (myself included) have no desire to don armour ourselves and whack at someone else who will have the effrontery to be whacking back. However, there is much more to the Society than fighting. Many of the arts and courtesies we use need more practice than once a month at a revel if they are to be natural and graceful. Therefor, I am officially opening the "Ferelith MacDonald School of Dance, Courtesy and Social Graces". No, we will not be practicing our Clench-a-Wench Technique. What I will be doing to trying my best to impart my small knowledge of Medieval and Renaissance Court Dancing and English Country Dancing. Also, in the weeks to come, we will touch on the basics of chess, courtly courtesies, social usage within the Society ("Now what is it I'm supposed to call the King?" "Why do I have to curtsey to her?" "Why are we bowing to an empty throne?") costuming ideas, finding your persona, etc. Being so new, there is still much for all of us to learn about all aspects of SCA and Tuesday nights is a great chance to mix and mingle with others who are learning.

Many of our Shirefolk will be travelling to various events within the Kingdom in the coming months. Check in the Calendar of Events and if you are interested in travelling to out of area events, please talk to us here at Hastle Castle and we will try to get you together with someone else interested in going and sharing expenses. (Shall we call it the "Ferelith Mac-Donald Travel Bureau"?)

Also, some of us have already made plans to attend the Kingdom Arts and Science Faire in al-Barran in March (provided we survive the Birthday Tourney). If you have any entries that you would like to send down in our care, please let us know. (And if you are wondering what an entry would be, please give me a call and we can talk about it.) This is a fine opportunity for the Shire to show its non-fighting abilities.

Thank you all for working so hard to make our collective experience in the Society a happy one.

Dear Sister;

I have met this simply fantastic guy. I would like him to come with me to a revel, but he doesn't have a costame. What can I do? I haven't much money and I'm not the worlds best seamstress.--Please Help


Dear Help:

If he is really that handsome I'd sure like to neet him. I'm not much of a seamstress myself so I asked Sister Envelopia, who makes all our clothes at the convent and here is a simple, but good looking costume she designed. It's best made out of a very loose weave, ucol-like, fabric. I'll take it step by step:

- Take a length of cloth that when folded in half will reach just about his knees...and then fold it in half.
- Fold it again so that you can cut a hole in the center for his head. Remember to keep the hole small, you can always enlarge it later.







Now if you want to make this costume really nice attach a hood to the neck hole (he does not have to use the hood but it helps make the costume look more period.) To make a hood:

a. Take a smaller piece of cloth, large enough to go from shoulder to shoulder over his head (Clever ya!)

b. Cut the hood out as shown by the dotted lines and sew up the back. Bells etc. are not unheard of at the end of the hood.

c. Now sew the hood to the neck hole so the seam is on the inside.

 Have your young man wear a bright turtleneck and dark pants, with a belt around the costume's waist, and you're set. This costume should fit just about anyone so if he doesn't like the Current Middle Ages, keep it and try again.

If you want sleeves just cut out the shape you want and sew up the sides.

There you go "Please" hope it will help.


We all participated in games of Blind Man's Bluff, Queen's Chair Out, and Blazons, while the Abbot ran games of Lou and Whist in the library.





It is perhaps an oversimplification to say that the world is made of two kinds of people, the professed and the unprofessed. Since I have been a person all of my life I am not particularly curious as to how the rest of the world lives, I already know. Since most of you have never been religous, there exists a degree of curiosity. Let us start things out by saying I am not a Nun. Canon law distinguishes between Moniales (Nuns) as having solemn vows, and Soroes (Sisters) only simple vows. In our order a girl enters the community as a Postulant. At this time she begins her studies and prepares to be clothed as a Novice. Following the Investing, the Novice begins two years of intense training and study, since the Noviciate is followed by profession of simple temporary yous.

I came from a family where little faith was put into religion. My father, a large gruff man who lost one eye in the Border Marches, used to say about religion, "Any church that is so disorganized as to have two Popes at the same time wasn't in the position to tell him either how to run his life or save his soul." When we were about 10 years of age, my mother insisted that we travel to Dolgellum to be educated by the sisters there. Leah, my twin sister, was a far better student than I, as a matter of fact I was neither the most docile nor obedient student the sisters had ever had the pleasure to instruct. It was therefore probably quite a shock to the community as well as my family when I asked my parents and Mother Geriatrica for permission to become a postulant. Since intellectual pursuits had never been of vast interest to me, I pictured my life in the order as being filled with helping the sick and dying. It was while I was a new postulant that we discovered I had not the stomach or temperment for such work. As Mother Geriatrica said, "God closed a door, and opened a window somewhere else." During the six months I spent as a Postulant I came to some very painful understandings with the community, if I truly wanted to stay ... I would do things their way.

In our Order, the Investing ceremony is rich in meaning and tradition. As a Bride I wore a habit made of white wool, a sheer weil, and a wreath of flowers. Following the High Mass I was lead to the cloister door where I knocked three times, and was admitted by Mother Geristrica. Behind the Grille I was helped into the Habit of a Novice by two of the newly professed sisters. If the Investing was the Triumphant Entry, the two years of the Noviciate were filled with a thousand small Calvaries. Sister Alligory, the Novice Mistress told us we were all precious stones in the rough, and like the patient jeweler she proceeded to grind, rub, polish, and work both our hodies and souls. The only trouble was that when she finished we were both aware that she had been working a

lump of stone. After taking my Vows, I was admitted into the choir, directed by our dedicated Sister Discordia, and assigned to assist in the education of young ladies at the convent's school.

For as long as Mother Geriatrica had been in charge of our bustling community she had dreamed of sending branches out over the wall to start daughter communities. Early last summer she received permission from the Bishop to start a new community in the far away shire of Am Mor Salann Fasach. Seven of us were chosen from the community to make this long journey. Our small band of wayfarers gathered together only the most meager provisions, and a small cart and ass to carry those items Mother felt were needed to set up house-keeping. Mother Geriatrica received word from the Seneschale, Ferelith MacDonald stating that she would welcome us to the Shire, and and that she would make arrangements for our lodgings until such time as we could find a house. After a special suffrage to Saints David and Christopher we were at last upon our great adventure.

The road we traveled was as populated as most roads in the Kingdom. From time to time we met other wayfarers and pilgrims. More than once we were overtaken by a string of pack mules and borsemen going the same direction as we were. Once a begging Friar came limping along in a brown habit, and implored us to give him just one groat to keep him from death. Sister Charity, the sacristan of the household was about to give the scoundrel our purse when we spotted a half-gnarled mutton bone sticking out of his pouch, to prove him a liar. We departed in great haste, but could not escape the curses of the four blessed Evangelists which the Medicant howled behind us. Later as we passed the edge of a wood, we came upon a Chapman devouring a great paste, and washing it down with drink from a stone jar. As we passed he broke a rough jest at Sister Voluptua, that would have made a mercenary face burn. Had the days not been so mild, and the country such an expression of God's Grace, some of the events of our journey might have given us to dispair. He were met at the Border near Montgomery by my brother-in-law, the Knight Marshall, Robert de Spencer, and from there we were escorted without incident across the great salt waste.

Upon our arrival in your gracious shire, Sister Apothicary set about finding leeches and herbs with which to start the infirmary. I was greeted by two fine young ladies, my nieces, who were given into my care for education. Sister Rotundia found us a spacious dwelling outside of town, and Sister Allergenica spent many miserable days preparing it for habitation. Under the instructions of Sister Incindary, our cook, the other sisters gathered together supplies for the house and larder. With you indulgent help we are now self-sufficient and progressing rather well.

With the supplication that you remember us in your prayers I set this by my hand this the day of Saint Polycarp A.S.VII.




A TURNABOUT TOURNAMENT

This is the first of a continuing series of articles written to acquaint the populace of Am Mor Salann Fasach with the history of the Middle Ages. It is designed to help both with choosing a persona and understanding the personas of those around you.

I have stolen these references freely from History of the Middle Ages, which I got out of the U of U library (actually, I xeroxed almost the entire book, if thou wouldst wish to see it, contact me.) It is written in outline form and very clear and concise. I will tend to just pick high points of interest.

Our period in the Society begins in 900 A.D., but in most cases I will begin earlier, so as to lead into the 10th century and pive some background information.

ENCLAND IN THE 10th CENTURY

During the 9th century the Danes invaded England and settled in the cast and north and brought Danish ways and laws in, but Alfred the Great defeated them and drove them out in 878. Alfred brought about reforms in law and reviewed learning, and many changes in the way of life began.

Alfred's reign ended in 900, but his successors, Ethelred and Edmund, carried on with his work. Danish territories were won back. the Christian Church was established, government became more settled, and a literature gradually took form. The customs brought into being at this time developed into some of the most permanent and fundamental institutions of the English people.

Edgar the Peaceful followed Edmund, during his reign (959-975) he was recognized as King of all England and Overlord of the Kings of Scotland and Wales. Danish invasions during this period and later were relatively unimportant, and although Canute the Great (1017-1035) was Danish, he was an extremely good king for England.

Next month the 10th Century in France, Germany, and Italy.

I would like, again, to encourage all of you to get subscribing memberships and to submit your devices (especially you fighters!) Those who have submitted their devices thus far are: Ferelith MacDonald, Jerilyn of Vert Silva, Robert de Spencer, Sister Scholastica, and Michael the Lucky. We have also submitted the Shire's device. I am always willing to help any of you-especially at fighter's practice, I have more time then than at revels.

Those of you who have asked questions, I will let you know as soon as the Principality Herald gets back to me. I really have not forgotten you.





To the fine fighters of Am Mor Salann Fasach, Greetings!

First let me compliment you as a group on the fine progress you have shown as fighters. As you continue to progress, matches will be won less by "that lucky shot" and more by the fighter who can wear down his opponent. Building endurance should be one of the fighter's first concerns, once he or she has completed a harness.

As modern aspirants to Knighthood we are working under somewhat of a disadvantage, what with fire chariots, moving stairs, and the like. Back when Knighthood was in flower...boys would start physical training when they were very young, and as life in general was somewhat more strenuous in those days it was not quite as difficult to maintain good conditioning. Here are a few suggestions that will help all of us to be better fighters.

1. GET ENOUGH SLEEP. Let's face it your athletic ability is

noticably impaired when the body is tired.

WATCH YOU DIET. It should go without saying your body will function better, and more efficiently if you eat the right kinds of food.

3. SET UP A REGULAR EXERCISE PROGRAM. I know from experience that this is the hardest, I'm not putting myself up as a prime example (do as I say, not as I do), but it will make the difference between an average to mediocre fighter, or the Enight we would all like to become.

4. BEFORE COMMAT WARM-UP. To avoid strains or painful cramps a serious fighter should never work-out without first warming up. As I have mentioned before you are encouraged to warm-up with the Karate class, but above all warm-up.

If you choose not to approach this gentle sport as an athlete, here are a few suggestions that might help as the fighter training becomes more strenuous.

a. CRAMPS, The actual cause of cramps is temporary lack of food, or oxygen to the muscles. Rubbing the muscle may cause it to relax. If you can keep working the muscle it will usually go away.

b. STRAINS, Most strains are caused by overworking certain muscles. Warm moist heat or in other words a long hot bath will help relieve the soreness.


